"I was a little bit shocked how friendly the working environment is," she says. "I expected it would be a very old-school and conservative place, where everyone would behave very formal."

The international environment of the IIR also really spoke to Natalie. She was able to engage in interesting and eye-opening discussions on current events with other interns from various parts of the world.

"It felt more like a second Erasmus than work," she says. "It was especially interesting to debate politics with the other interns, because all of us came from a different part of the world and we were very passionate about everything that was going on. It often made me see things from a different perspective."

NEW CAREER GOALS

During her internship, Natalie assisted some of the researchers in their work or at talks that were organized for the interns. "I could work directly with the academic researchers, which gave me quite clear idea, how this kind of work looks like," she says.

One of her projects involved studying the concept of "hybrid warfare" in the Czech media. She continued to help with this research even after her internship ended. "I feel I really understand much clearer how is the research done," she says. This project in particular helped her "understand how the discussion on this specific topic is created in the Czech Republic."

Her experience also allowed Natalie to refine her career path. Although she had been originally considering a career in research, her internship at IIR made her realise she prefers conference production. IIR organizes many events and conferences throughout the year, including the Prague European Summit. This experience showed Natalie where she would like to focus her professional efforts.

"I liked being a part of these big and important events," she says. "I knew I would never be able to get to these conferences or listen to the interesting panels if I wasn't an intern at the IIR."
